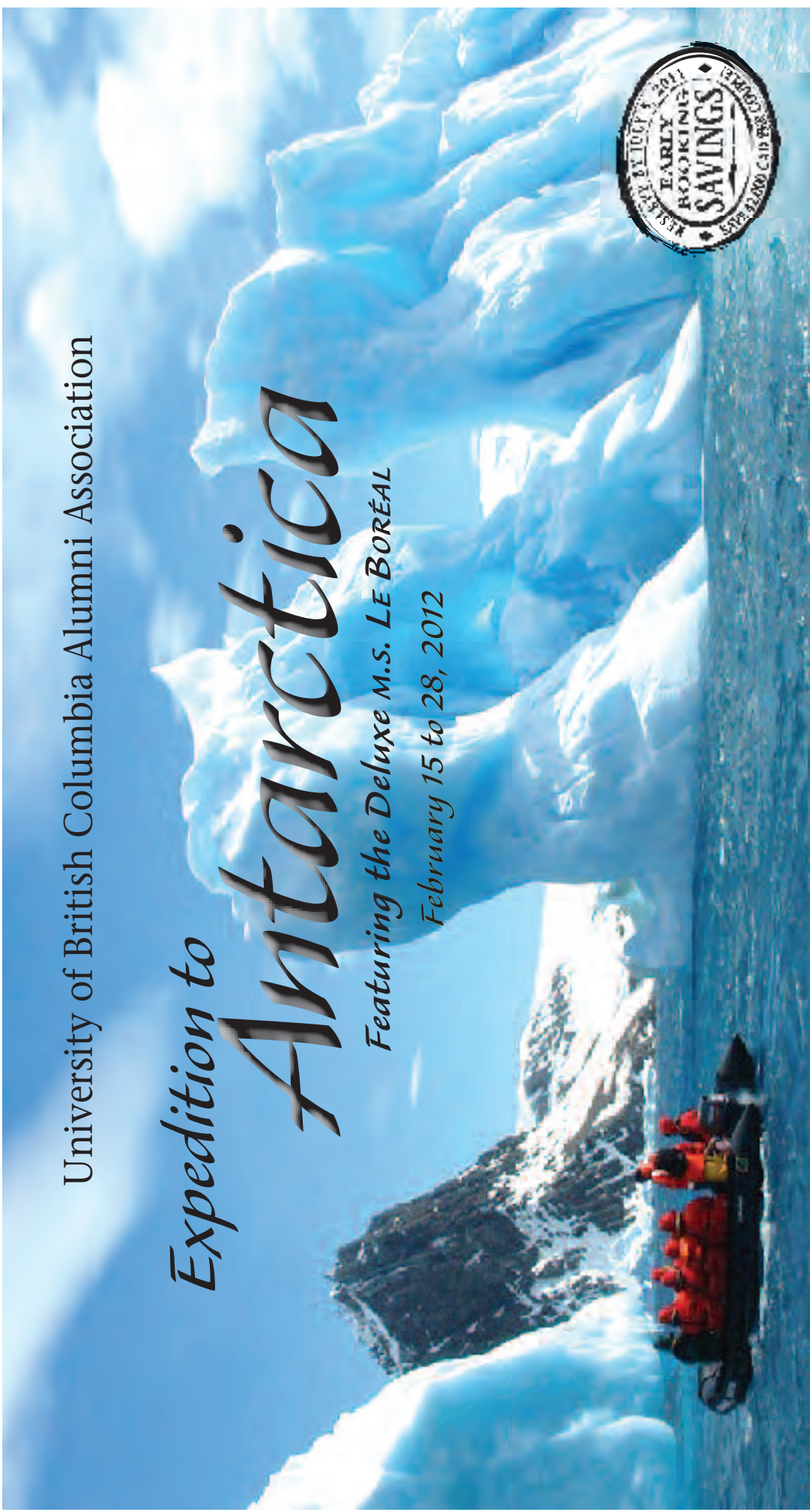

"Everything wears an aspect of unreality," Ernest Shackleton wrote. "Icebergs hang upside-down in the sky, the land appears as layers of silvery or golden cloud, cloud banks look like land, and icebergs masquerade as islands." This is Antarctica, Earth's last frontier. Normal human scales and reference points disappear amid fantastically shaped icebergs, lively penguin rookeries and breaching whales. This is nature in its most pristine form.

Few travelers have followed the adventuresome explorers Shackleton, Amundsen and Scott to the Antarctic. Now, you have an opportunity to experience this untouched wilderness aboard the finest vessel cruising the Antarctic waters, exclusively chartered, deluxe M.S. LE BORÉAL. This state-of-the-art vessel launched in 2010 raises the small ship cruise experience to new heights, combining innovative design with personalized service in a welcoming and intimate setting and featuring private balconies in 95% of the deluxe, outside accommodations.

To enhance your Antarctic experience, the ship is staffed with an expert expedition team of naturalists who will guide you on excursions ashore. Under their direction, you will board sturdy Zodiac craft for landings on rocky shores and beaches to observe the antics of Antarctica's bountiful wildlife—penguins and seals, especially, are unafraid of human visitors—and discover the secrets of the White Continent.

Experience Antarctica now in its unspoiled state. You will sail for nine nights during the lingering light of the austral summer, when long sunrises paint the icescape in soft shades of pink and gold as whales, seals and penguins flock to glimmering turquoise glaciers and sparkling icebergs. Wildlife Conservation

The unique international Antarctic Treaty protects Antarctica's wildlife and its natural habitats and provides a guide for visitors to this great continent, where no country has sovereignty.

To protect the fragile Antarctic environment, all participants will go ashore in small groups, so as not to overvisit rookeries, disturb nesting sites or disrupt research. All visitors will be asked to take—and leave—nothing ashore.

Buenos Aires, Argentina

Thursday, February 16

Arrive in cosmopolitan Buenos Aires and check into the deluxe MARRIOTT PLAZA HOTEL, adjacent to the chic boutique-lined Calle Florida. This evening, attend the welcome reception.

Buenos Aires

Friday, February 17

The city tour highlights Buenos Aires' diverse *barrios* (neighbourhoods), from the colourful La Boca district and the city centre's grand public buildings to the parks of Palermo, Plaza de Mayo and Puerto Madero, as well as the charming old quarter of San Telmo. Visit the historic Recoleta Cemetery, famous for its ornate vaults and sculptures and as the final resting place of the legendary Evita Perón.



Known as the "Wanderer," the majestic albatross has a wingspan of up to 3.35 metres, enabling it to fly for hundreds of kilometres at a time in search of food.

Buenos Aires/Ushuaia

Saturday, February 18

Fly to rustic Ushuaia, the world's southernmost city and gateway to Antarctica. This afternoon, embark M.S. LE BORÉAL and cruise through the Beagle Channel, named for the ship that carried Charles Darwin on his South American voyages. Attend the Captain's welcome reception this evening.

Cruising Drake Passage

Sunday, February 19

Cross the legendary Drake Passage. Upon reaching the Antarctic Convergence, watch for breaching fin, humpback and minke whales and seabirds feeding on plankton and krill brought to the surface by the cold Antarctic waters merging with the warmer waters of the South Pacific and Atlantic Oceans.

Cruising Antarctica Monday, February 20 to Friday, February 24

The ship cruises below the 60th parallel to the outer shores and islands of the Antarctic Peninsula, the world's last frontier. Here, explore Earth's most pristine wilderness, where towering mountains of ice and lava create precipitous coastlines and islands, and constantly changing patterns of ice stretch as far as the eye can see. In this seemingly harsh environment, a vast array of wildlife flourishes, including millions of penguins, countless seabirds and thousands of seals and whales. From spectacular volcanic topography and majestic glaciers to fascinating wildlife and historic outposts, this itinerary incorporates the following destinations for the complete Antarctica experience.

Please note that the ship's cruising pattern and destinations are dependent on weather, ice and sea conditions and are subject to change.

One of the smallest but most beautiful South Shetland Islands, **Half Moon Island** is a crescent-shaped isle known for its craggy volcanic rock formations and tranquil lagoons. It is also the site of Camara Station, a base staffed by Argentine biologists monitoring regional wildlife. Observe the antics of the island's colony of chinstrap penguins and enjoy the lingering twilight of the Antarctic summer.

Deception Island is actually the rim of a massive dormant volcano crater that encircles a lake known as Port Foster. The ship enters Port Foster through dramatic Neptune's Bellows, a sublime harbor ringed by snowcapped peaks and sheer cliffs. In Pendulum Cove, you may, conditions permitting, have the opportunity to wade or swim in steaming, geothermally heated waters of the Antarctic. Observe the amazing colony of one-quarter of one million chinstrap penguins at Baily Head. Then walk along the black sand beaches of Telefon Bay to nearby craters, which offer fascinating insight into the volcanic activity that created the island and played a pivotal role in the natural history of the region.

In **Paradise Bay**, awesome cliffs of ice descend from the surrounding mountains into the floating iceberg-laden waters along the western coast of the Antarctic Peninsula. Named by 19th-century whalers who sought shelter in its coves, Paradise Bay is an ideal sanctuary for marine wildlife including humpback whales, crabeater seals and Cape petrels. Listen for the low rumbling of Rudolf Glacier as it calves chunks of ice into **Neko Harbour**, one of the most dramatic and spectacular sights in Antarctica. Named for an early 20th-century whaling boat, the harbour is surrounded by soaring glaciers and snow-covered mountains. Here, make your first "continental landing" in Antarctica.

Cruise through breathtaking, glacier-lined **Neumayer Channel** to **Port Lockroy**. Originally constructed in 1944 by an eight-man team as an intelligence post for British espionage during World War II, Port Lockroy was converted into a

whaling station and scientific base in the 1950s. It is nestled among glistening mountain peaks as high as 1,800 metres, and the surrounding grounds are populated by blue-eyed shags and gentoo penguins. Gain insight into the lives of past explorers at the British Antarctic Survey Museum and send a postcard with an Antarctica postmark from the official British Post Office. Just beyond Port Lockroy, enjoy an excursion to the rocky shores of Jougla Point on

Wiencke Island. Experience this rare opportunity to view the nearly intact skeleton of a large whale, and see large colonies of gentoo penguins as well as blue-eyed shags and kelp gulls.

Flanked by sheer cliffs of towering glaciers between the Antarctic Peninsula and Booth Island, **Lemaire Channel** offers views of 11 majestic kilometres of mountains and wildlife combined with fascinating patterns of ice floes. Call at **Petermann Island**, the southernmost point of your journey, and watch its thriving rookeries of Adélie and gentoo penguins and blue-eyed shags.

Enter the **Weddell Sea** and spot the enormous tabular icebergs that have calved from the Larsen Ice Shelf. See **Brown Bluff's** 746-metre-high, rust-colored cliffs jutting into the Antarctic Sound, and land on the shelving beach at the base of the bluff.

Observe friendly members of the area's flourishing colony of Adélie penguins, who may approach you for an up-close encounter.

Cruising Drake Passage

Saturday, February 25

Relax and reflect onboard today as the ship turns north and crosses the Drake Passage.

Drake Passage/Cape Horn

Sunday, February 26

Enjoy lively, informative discussions with the ship's naturalists. Watch for endangered albatross and the many different species of petrels as you cruise across the Antarctic Convergence and past Cape Horn, the most southerly point of South America and a milestone on the world's trade routes from the 18th century until the opening of the Panama Canal in 1914. Attend the Captain's farewell reception this evening.

Ushuaia/Buenos Aires

Monday, February 27

Disembark and fly to Buenos Aires. Your return flight to Canada departs this evening.

The 120 large, deluxe, air-conditioned, outside Staterooms and Suites range in size from 18.5 to 45 square metres (200 to 484 square feet). Ninety-five percent of the accommodations feature private balconies.

Most Suites and Staterooms feature two twin beds that convert to one queen-size bed, a private bathroom with shower (bathtub in limited number of staterooms), and the luxurious amenities of a fine hotel, including individual climate control, satellite flatscreen television, wireless Internet access, safe, minibar, full-length closet, writing desk/dressing table and plush robes.

Your Expedition Team

Members of the onboard expedition team are seasoned experts and naturalists who have studied and travelled extensively in the most remote regions of the world. Their areas of expertise span marine biology, ornithology, ecology, geology, glaciology, conservation and environmental education, as well as history and photography. The team's experience, enthusiasm for sharing their knowledge and a particular interest in climate change and its impact on the world's ecosystems make them exceptionally well suited to accompany your Expedition to Antarctica.

Canadian Exploration of Antarctica

The intrepid deeds of such famed European explorers of Antarctica as Roald Amundsen, Robert Falcon Scott and Ernest Shackleton have long been recounted in gripping personal tales and history books. Canadians too, played a significant role in the exploration of Antarctica, particularly Sir Charles Seymour Wright, physicist, glaciologist and assistant to the meteorologist on Scott's ill-fated expedition to the South Pole. Persuaded into joining Scott's second expedition (1910-1913), Wright barely survived his first encounter with the Antarctic and was one of the last people to see Scott alive. In mid-November 1912, Wright located the frozen remains of Scott and two other members of his South Pole party. A dedicated scientist, Wright went on to lead the team responsible for the early development of radar.

Returning to Canada in 1947, subsequent scientific research brought him back to the Antarctic. It was during his last tour in 1965 that he flew along Wright Valley, named in his honour in 1959. After his death in 1975, Wright's ashes were consigned to the sea off Esquimalt, from the deck of the Canadian destroyer HMCS *Restigouche*.

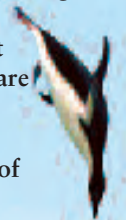

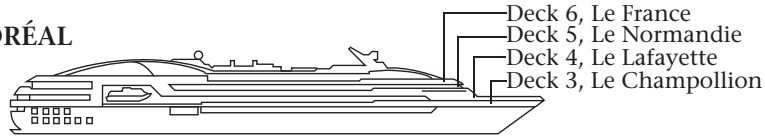

RESPONSIBILITY: Thomas P. Gohagan & Company, the sponsoring institution or association, and its and their employees, shareholders, subsidiaries, affiliates, officers, directors or trustees, successors, agents, and assigns (collectively "Gohagan"), do not own or operate any entity which is to or does provide goods or services for your trip including, for example, lodging facilities, airline, vessel, or other transportation companies, guides or guide services, local ground operators, providers or organizers of optional excursions, food service providers, etc. All such persons and entities are independent contractors. As a result, Gohagan is not liable for any negligent or willful act or failure to act of any such person or entity of any third party.

In addition and without limitation, Gohagan is not responsible for any injury, loss, death, inconvenience, delay, or damage to person or property in connection with the provision of any goods or services whether resulting from, but not limited to, acts of God or force majeure, acts of war or civil unrest, insurrection or revolt, animals, strikes or other labour activities, criminal or terrorist activities of any kind, sickness, illness, the lack of availability of or access to appropriate medical attention, overbooking or downgrading of accommodations, mechanical or other failure of airplanes or other means of transportation, or for any failure of any transportation mechanism to arrive or depart on time.

HEALTH: No sophisticated medical facilities are available in the Antarctic. The vessel carries a physician and a limited infirmary with basic medications and equipment, and its medical facilities are not equipped for serious illness or accidents. Evacuation is difficult, time consuming and expensive. Consequently, you should consult with our physician before booking this trip. We recommend you purchase medical evacuation insurance. Any physical or mental condition that may require special medical attention or physical assistance (for example, the need for a wheelchair) must be reported in writing when you make your reservation. Participants must be able to climb stairs and step over raised thresholds or bulkheads aboard the ship without assistance.

DISCOUNTED RESERVATIONS: Discounts apply only to those reservations received in the offices of Gohagan in writing, accompanied by the required deposit, by July 5, 2011. In the event a "discounted" reservation must be cancelled, no "replacement" reservation can be substituted at the discounted rate. A "replacement" reservation is a new reservation and can be substituted only at the full-fare tariff. Cancellation penalties may apply.
